FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...

Nau mai haere mai ki te kura o Hato Hoani Paukau - St John Bosco School. May God bless you on your educational journey with us. We will nurture and grow your children and enable them to be the best version of themselves everyday on their journey to reaching their full potential.

We have recently analysed our maths and reading data across the school. This is where teachers utilise assessment data to form an overall judgment as to how well each child is achieving. You will see this assessment on HERO. Our overall data illustrates a good picture for our learners. In Reading, across the school, we see that 84% of learners are achieving at or above expectation. The data for our maori children shows that 83% are achieving at or above expectations. In maths, across the school our overall picture shows that 88% of children are achieving at or beyond curriculum level expectations. The data for our maori children illustrates a similar picture with 85%. Achievable equitable outcomes for all our learners is at the heart of what we do and we continually strive to innovate, improve, reduce barriers and drive our children towards their potential, whatever that might be.

Last Friday our staff travelled out to Parihaka marae to experience the wairua of the place for ourselves and to hear stories first hand of the immense history at Parihaka marae. The importance of Parihaka and the relevance for our school is multi faceted. One such facet is the Aotearoa Histories curriculum that we teach. Local history and stories that perhaps haven't been told are a critical element and having staff who have authentically experienced this place is essential to effectively teaching about it. We also have a long held connection to parihaka via the Rukuwai whanau who have had grandchildren attend this school over the past decade. We also commemorate and honour Parihaka Day, each year on the 5th of November (instead of Guy Fawkes). For those interested in learning a bit more about the story of Parihaka I can recommend a book called "Ask that Mountain" by Dick Scott.

Next Sunday the 16th of June is our school mass at Our Lady Help of Christians which begins at 10:30. It is always great to come together in worship so please block this one out in your diary.

Sickness is pretty prevalent at the moment so do take care. I personally copped it pretty bad last week so I know it isn't much fun!

There is also plenty of lost property on the racks at the moment so be sure to have a look next time you're in school.


We pray that migrants fleeing from war or hunger, forced to undertake journeys full of danger and violence, find welcome and new opportunities in the countries that receive them.

Important Feast Days

The Most Holy Trinity Sunday 26 May

Trinity Sunday is the day we celebrate the truth that God is made up of the Father, the Son (Jesus) and the Holy Spirit. The bible tells us that there is only one God but that this God is made up of three parts, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The word we use to describe this 3 in 1 God is "Trinity." That is a word made up of the word "Tri" which means "3" (eg A tricycle has 3 wheels) and the word "Unity," which means "One" or being unified together.





The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) Sunday 2 June

Cross and Crucifix?

A Christian cross is simply a T-shaped symbol, whereas a crucifix is a cross with the image of Christ's body, what is commonly referred to as the **corpus**. Both the cross and the crucifix are the two of the most identifiable symbols of Christianity. A crucifix is generally identified with the Catholic and Orthodox traditions, and a cross with Protestant.

The feast of Corpus Christ or The Body and Blood of Christ. This is the Holy Day to remember the Sacrament of the Eucharist or Holy Communion. Many Parishes will have children making their first communion on this day.

The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Friday 7 June

This day celebrates the Sacred Heart of Jesus that is the symbol of God's infinite love - the symbol of His own generous self-sacrificing love for everyone. Jesus shows His Divine Heart as a fire whose burning rays of love are able to revive faith and rekindle love in hearts grown cold and unthankful.







The church is now in the season of Ordinary time.

Ordinary Time is the longest season in the Church's year. It is thirty-three weeks and divided into two sections; one short and the other very long. Ordinary Time in our liturgical calendar distinguishes it from the other seasons—Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. Ordinary Time celebrates Jesus' teaching and ministry and is a time to reflect on how we live as disciples of Jesus following his teachings. GREEN, the colour of Ordinary Time, It is the rich colour of growth and new life. Ordinary Time contains the essence of who we are as everyday Catholics.

Class Mass

Attending Mass is important for supporting the RE program in classrooms.

We invite and encourage you to attend our weekday class Masses where possible.

We would love to see parents, grandparents and friends at our weekly children's mass.

We have a play area for preschoolers and please don't worry about them making a noise.




