Dear Parents, Caregivers and friends of the school.

Six weeks has flown by in a whir of events, trips, assessments, sunshine and success.

We were very proud of our Kapa Haka roopu who performed at the annual Puanga Festival on Wednesday the 29th of October. We have worked diligently with our new kapa haka tutor whaea Wharekuuka to learn a new bracket. A big highlight for me was the refining of our haka to better align with our school pepeha and local iwi, Te Atiawa.

Today's athletics event was a great day for our community to come together to watch our children demonstrate their skills and hard work in PE over the past month. Many thanks to Ms Lynskey for the huge effort in preparing our children and in organising a day that ran like clockwork. A tough day for Mr Fleming's hamstrings, however. I was fortunate enough to be on the 'sprints' event today. In every single one of the Year 4-6 finals races we required a photo finish to determine who won which is testament to the talent and standard of athleticism in our students. But ultimately, today isn't about placings. It is about having a go, defining success as trying your best and enjoying being active with a smile on our faces so all of our children should be very proud of themselves today. As should our teachers relay team of Mr O'Sullivan, Mrs White, Mrs Ormond and Mr Fleming who gave the Year 6 team a real run for their money. The final result is still with the adjudicators.

Every year we commemorate Parihaka Day with a series of house activities based around a special 'Parihaka curriculum' we began piloting in 2019. This is called 'Parihaka Mai Ai,' and comes from a statement made by Tohu and Te Whiti to their whānau who were forcibly being removed from Parihaka in the wake of the invasion on November 5th, 1881. We tell the story of Parihaka to our children and I was very proud to be recently informed that our former students have impressed their Intermediate Schools with the knowledge of this story.

Over the past month or so Lachlan Severinson, Eden Smith, Lexi White and Oskar McGregor have been working super hard on their science fair investigation into how even 'hands free' calling in cars can reduce reaction times and are therefore a safety issue. They've written letters to parliament (and received replies!!), conducted their own experiments under carefully controlled conditions to test their hypothesis and on Thursday they took their display to the Primary Science fair. I'm just proud of our children for having a go but they came second overall! Well done team.

Our Year 6 students returned from 3 days at camp late last week. Vertical Horizons camp out the back of Inglewood has been a staple of the Year 6 experience at St John Bosco school for some time now and it is a treasure of a place. Zip lines, flying kiwi, kayaking, water slides and much more make it a great mix of challenge and fun. Many thanks to Mrs Crystal Smith and Mr O'Sullivan who take time away from their families to provide such a great experience for our children.




Sunday 9th November THE DEDICATION of the LATERAN BASILICA


Sunday 16th November - World Day of the Poor










21st November - The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary


















Attending Mass is important for supporting the RE program in classrooms.







It was sooooo much fun so a big thank you to our parent helpers vertical horizons staff and Me Smith and Mr O'Sullivan for coming!


